Editor's Notes

For some reason this, my final *Exhaust Notes*, has proved more difficult to assemble than most. No reports of fantastic rides or visits to foreign parts (well, it is winter), a lot of interesting stuff emerging in Committee meetings (but not enough on any one topic for an article) and, finally, a glitch when the draft was 75% ready that made the entire master file unreadable.

Anyway, I've recovered the corrupted file and decided to fill this page with the scraps of information I pick up at Committee meetings (if I get anything wrong – blame the poor acoustics).

Firstly, there's some HQ stuff. IAM House took over the administration of Associates memberships last April.

This is good news, as trying to keep track of whether people were still members of IAM and of the Group when one membership was renewable on an anniversary and the other at a fixed time of year was a bit of a nightmare.

IAM HQ has also been pushing RideCheck – where punters pay £30 for a one hour assessed ride but get a £25 discount on their Skills for Life package if they sign up within 30 days (the remaining £5 is a contribution to the Observer's expenses). We can still give Public Assessed Rides but punters will only get a verbal assessment and IAM HQ isn't publicising them.

We have another intrepid journalist lined up for a pillion trip on an Observer's bike, this time from

Swindon.

The most exciting news, in my view, is that two Committee members, Stu and Les, have made contact with groups of riders interested in the Skills for Life concept.

Stu Price has made contact with an enthusiastic group of Wiltshire riders, many of whom are at the 125cc stage. Several have already had Public Assessed Rides with Stu and a few have already applied for Skills for Life. Well done that man!

Les Snelgrove has received an enquiry from an MoD group that wants to do Skills for Life. That's 20 people all at once – it's just as well that the fore-thoughtful Ken Fryer has been planning and pushing to expand our Observer numbers!

Making Bikers Safe

Riding a motorbike is, without a doubt, an exhilarating experience – but it is also potentially very dangerous. This year, up to August 31, four bikers were killed on Wiltshire's roads, another 49 received serious injuries and 107 slight injuries.

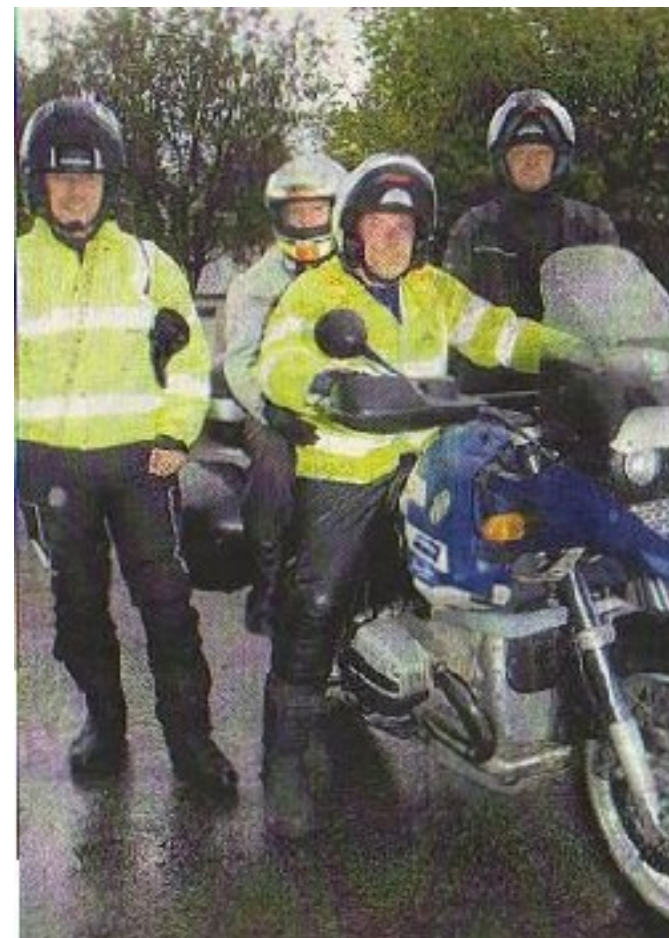
In a bid to keep more riders safe on the roads, the Wilts and Bath Advanced Motorcyclists was set up 18 months ago to equip riders with skills and techniques to help keep them safe on the road. Now the group has 140 members and 45 are currently in training to take a test for the Advanced Motorcycling Certificates.

“The basic motorcycle test is exactly that,” said Senior Observer Martyn Buckland. “It teaches you how to ride a bike to a basic standard. A lot of people took their test a long time ago,

have kept their licence and are now coming back to motorbiking. Many people who join us are in this category and want to develop their skills.” he said.

On a Saturday morning I joined Mr Buckland and his two trainees in Chippenham for an hour-long session to find out what advanced motorcycling involves.

Mr Buckland, 51, from Broughton Gifford, began biking when he was 16 and, after a break, returned to the saddle 15 years ago. He rides a BMW and trained as an Observer and Senior Observer. “It keeps my skills up,” he said. “My psychological profile shows I seek out excitement – this is a good way to keep myself in line, and to put something back.” The course involves at least ten hours observed riding on

all types of roads and under a variety of conditions.

Mr Buckland's protégées were Bill Thorpe, 43, a telecommunications consultant from Swindon, and David Brown, 45, who works for a US software company.

Mr Brown went back to motorbiking after an 18-year break and was inspired by a RideSafe day organised by the police. "I've learned a lot and thoroughly enjoyed it," he said. "I've learned to be more aware of everything that was going on around me."

Mr Thorpe started riding a motor-

bike two years ago and attended the same BikeSafe day. "I was so impressed by the standard of riding of the police motorcyclists," he said.

The session began in Chippenham, riding through Lyneham and Calne while Mr Buckland subjected the trainees to minute scrutiny. At debriefing sessions he ran through the good manoeuvres and improvements to be made.

The course requires riders to be aware of any potential hazard. It is a challenging test and riders have to be able to recall such details as how

many dogs they pass (off a lead, dogs may be a hazard), manhole covers and vehicles.

The course culminates in a road test, if participants wish to take it. The test lasts around one-and-a-half hours. The pass rate is around 85 percent, after taking the course.

"The examiner is looking for compliance with the Highway Code and speed limits but, over and above that, they are looking for smoothness, confidence and making good progress," said Mr Buckland.

Ride-out after the AGM

There will be ride-out after the AGM – length chosen to suit the time between the end of official business and when the calls for sustenance become too strident to be ignored. A mystery route, ending at a suitable watering-hole.

(In other words Martyn hasn't told the Editor where he's going in time for publication!)
